

## Swedes fire on suspected intruder

Swedish submarine hunters detonated underwater mines and fired anti-submarine grenades from a helicopter while chasing a suspected foreign submarine in the archipelago southeast of Stockholm at the end of last month.

There was no immediate evidence of any hit and the search was being continued, said defence staff officials.

However, the bulk of this neutral country's antisubmarine forces were not available because crews are cut to a minimum during winter when strategic coastal areas are

usually under ice. However, this year most of the Baltic Sea has remained open.


The hunt started on 24 February following a reading of a passing submarine on a submerged magnetic indicator at Mailsten, outside Musko, one of Sweden's biggest naval bases. One mine was detonated, officials said.

Four days later two more mines were fired, northeast of the base, between the islands

Uto and Orno. A sonar reading also prompted a navy helicopter to drop anti-submarine grenades outside the small island-group Gunnarstenarne, south of the base. However, the military said the helicopter appeared to have reacted to a false alarm.

"We shoot first and make the analysis later," said Thomas Gur, a defence staff spokesman.

Swedish waters have been repeatedly violated by foreign submarines over the last 10 years. Sweden has upgraded its defences since a Soviet submarine ran aground outside a naval base in 1981.




Yours is a great responsibility, but you will succeed.






M-5 firing mechanism undergoing magnetic tests.


MN2 Dennis J. Doerr reenlisted for four years in a ceremony held at COMNAVBASE on May 7.

#### **Hobson memorial service**

The 176 men aboard the destroyer minesweeper Hobson, which sank in the mid-Atlantic April 26, 1952, were remembered Sunday at a memorial service at White Point Garden in Charleston. The address was given by Capt. Robin T. White, U.S. Navy chief of staff at the Charleston Naval Base. Wreaths were placed by the Hobson Memorial Society; L. Mendel Rivers Branch 50 of the Fleet

Reserve Association; Association of Minemen; American Legion, Post 166; Sons of Legionnaires, Post 166; and Veterans of Foreign Wars, Post 5091. The Hobson Monument was dedicated April 25, 1954, and memorial services have been held at the park in succeeding years on the Sunday nearest the anniversary of the ship's sinking.

Also participating in the ceremony from COMOMAG were MN1 Lemuel Smith and MNSA Beverly Swinner who laid the Association of Minemen wreath at the base of the monument. They also escorted representatives from the other veterans organizations that laid wreaths. This is an annual memorial service that we and the local Fleet Reserve Association assist the USS Hobson Memorial Society in conducting. It is not widely known, but a Mineman Third Class George Swan lost his life when the USS Hobson was sunk. His name is inscribed on the monument along with the names of 175 other men that perished in the tragic accident.

#### Women of MOMAG Unit 11 prove themselves in once-male rate

While the Navy nursing corps celebrates its 82nd anniversary this month, the women at Mobile Mine Assembly Group Unit 11 are building their own traditions in a field that's only been open to women since 1975.

The mineman rate is flatout physical. The days are spent refurbishing practice mines and involves welding, spray painting, electronics and fork lifts, among other things. Out of 74 sailors stationed at MOMAG Unit 11, 17 of them, or 22 percent, are female. That's a big stride considering that 15 years ago it was 100 percent male. It's also a percentage that will possibly be growing.

"We expect that number to go up. Our goal is forty percent of the mine force being female

by 1992, even though that may be reduced," said Lt. Homer Reagan, officer-in-charge of MOMAG Unit 11. "But, even though I feel we definitely have the best women in the Navy, we don't have males or females here, we have sailors.

"They may feel like they have an extra challenge by coming into a long-time, male-dominated field, but they aren't scared to do anything I ask of them," he added. "Our production deck is a proving ground for all sailors."

While the women of MOMAG Unit 11 feel that they are treated as equals, they agree that coming into a male-dominated field is something of a challenge.

MN3 Yulandraul Simpson became a mineman, she said, because it dealt with "a lot of electrical work." Now in her third year of service, she said attitudes and expectations have changed.

"I figured it would be tough

because of chauvinistic men in the rate, like it would be a stumbling block," she said. "But attitudes have changed a lot. The woman's role in the mine force has changed dramatically, but that has been systematic, not forced. People realized that women could play a vital part in the mission."

Another sailor at MOMAG entered the mine force in a more roundabout way. MN3 Sandra Davis, another threeyear veteran, said she originally intended to be an aerographer's mate but took an immediate opening to Mineman "A" School. Davis said she did not know at the time that the rating was open to women for only a short time; she also never thought she would be working with so many mechanical implements.

"I found out when I got here that some men had an attitude like we had to earn their respect," she said. "But we get the same pay so we're supposed to do the same job. It has changed, though, and now some of them feel that a girl can do a better job."

MNSN Andrea Edwards said she looked for shore duty and, when the recruiters offered up mineman, she went for it. Not only is it a tough job, Edwards noted, but "it's a chance to get physical as opposed to a traditional female job; it's not stereotypical."

MN2 Colleen Sabel, a 10-year veteran of the mine force, agrees about the demands of the work.

"To be honest, the idea of working with explosives appealed to me as exciting work, as opposed to working behind a desk.

It's also fast-paced and everyday there's something new. There's more and more females coming into the rate since we proved we can handle it and (that) it's not just a guy's job."

How do the parents of these tradition-breaking women feel?

"Dad was pretty proud of it," Sabel said. "Mom just said 'honey, be careful.' ''


