Roger volunteered to head up the planning efforts for our reunion picnic and Will and John nailed down host hotel, early bird, business meeting and golf arrangements. This has been a big load, folks. Our theme is "BLUE AND GOLD" this year. We have lots in store for what promises to be a gala weekend. Maps (charts) and directions for all events will be available for everyone at the host hotel and Early Bird - at other events, too. Photo coverage will be provided by the *very lovely* Marty Acres of Flash Foto Studio, Charleston for our reunion book. Let me recap our plans for events as they will happen - in chronological order.

Our host hotel for the reunion will be the Knight's Inn on Aviation Avenue, which is off of Interstate 26 (I-26) at Exit 211A as you either approach Charleston from I-95, or leave Charleston from downtown or come from Route 17 (Mt. Pleasant or Savannah). They have given us special booking prices for an entire block of both regular rooms and suites - all of which are nice accommodations. Rooms vary in per night price from singles at \$24.00, one pers-two beds with micro/frig at \$27.00, two pers-one bed with micro/frig \$30.00, two pers-two beds with micro/frig at \$32.00, and suites at \$40.00. Plastic is accepted, except no Discover cards. Make your reservations early by calling 1-800-845-1927 to be able to book into the AOM block of rooms and be close to all your shipmates and room parties.

RV Park accommodations with full hookups are a little harder to come by. Fains Campground is the closest to events (walking distance to host hotel and Early Bird) - use the same exit as for host hotel, but make a right turn onto Fain Road, go past Holiday Inn and campground is on the left (\$18.00 p/day for up to two pers, bath house, but no pool or laundry, call 803-744-1005). KOA Campgrounds is located in the Summerville area as you approach Charleston from I-95, about 15 minutes drive to the host hotel area - exit from I-26 onto exit 205/205A and proceed West for one mile to 9494 Hwy 78 (for two pers \$19.00 p/day for water/ elec hookup, \$22.00 for full hookup, \$25.00 p/day for full hookup w/air, have pool, laundry, rec hall, playground, area tours from campground, call 803-797-1045). The James Island County Park RV Campground is the newest and is only ten minutes drive to the ocean - from host hotel, take I-26 to Charleston (end of I-26) then Rt 17 South toward Savannah, across Ashley River Bridge then Rt 700 towards Folly Beach/Kiawah, cross Inland Waterway over Wappoo Bridge, stay straight on Folly Road for 5 stop lights, make right onto Camp Road and go 1/ 2 mile to end, make right onto Riverland Drive, then left into park (\$18.00 p/ day for full hookup, \$16.00 for water/elec hookup, age 62+ discount, no pool, but everything else, call 803-795-9884).

On Friday evening, beginning at 6:00PM, our Early Bird get-together and reservations will take place at Sigi's Schnitzelhaus (German Restaurant) which is a half-block walking distance from the hotel. The owners and the chef are retired military, and they have gone all-out to provide us a great meeting place, eats on the side, and reasonable drink rates at the bar.



ALERT !!!

Carroll Delaney, our member from O'Fallon MO passed on this information that may be of interest or concern to Minemen who participated in "Operation Castle" in April 1954 and may have been exposed to lowlevel ionizing radiation. He recalls a small group of approximately 50 personnel from Mine Division TWO out of Hawthorne, Nevada? He does not remember all the details of the alert he saw published in a magazine, but is positive that it required the person to submit their service data (name, branch of service, service number, SSN, name of test series. date of test series, and unit attached to during the tests) to the Defense Nuclear Agency, Attn: DNA-NTPR, Washington, D.C. 20305-1000 to receive a report of the exposure survey. This might help someone to obtain veteran's health care if they were unduly exposed to adverse radiation during their active duty service.

Well...Murphy caught us again. I know we told you we would place one last order for mine models in May, but the Philippine political situation kinda forced the issue, and the military closed down our MOMAG operation there before we could get a guaranteed delivery. Our source there is no longer available. That's not the end of the bad news.

In good faith and anticipation of receipt of more mine models, we admonished one and all to get in their bid for the models before they became more scarce than hen's teeth (where <u>did</u> that saying come from?). If only the response for membership renewals had been as overwhelming!!! We received an avalanche of orders since the last issue...namely 23 requests thru the end of June...and the MK 6 was the most popular choice. The wealth of orders has depleted our stock of MK 6 mine models and, for the time being, are no longer available. All orders received for MK 6's thru 31 December 1991 will be honored and shipped; subsequent orders cannot be filled at this time. This applies <u>only</u> to the MK 6 models; all other mine model requests will be filled. Our last shipment was banged around and slightly damaged in transit, so minor repairs and paint touch-up has delayed shipment in some cases. Bear with us!!!

We are trying to locate a domestic source for more models. Anyone who can shed light on a possible source, PLEASE let us know. We will be glad to subsidize a hobbyist who is interested in making molds and resin compound castings of our models for resale back to our organization on a wholesale basis. Have them contact me ASAP. In the meantime, we will plan to hold MK 6 model orders in a "pending status" until Labor Day, and if a new source is not found, we will refund your money (you can always tell us to donate the money to our scholarship or museum fund as an alternative).

Also, more bad news! According to a breakdown of our most recent invoices, we have recently been selling the bulk of our clothing at bargain prices (translated, this means a <u>loss</u>, folks). Only Congress can exist on deficit spending, so close examination of the new price list in this issue will show an increase in prices. We held on through three increases from our supplier but can no longer do so. Prices reflect actual cost plus a modest 15% profit (the books are open for anyone to examine) to go to our organization operating funds. Check it out...we still have the best bargains around.
