
2025 SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE REPORT

History report: US Navy Minemen stationed in Atsugi, Japan from 1969 to 1970

The lives of US Navy Minemen stationed in Atsugi, Japan from 1969 to 1970 were a complex mix of duty, leisure, and cultural immersion, shaped by the Cold War context and the unique environment of post-war Japan. Here's a breakdown of some key aspects:

Duty:

- Focus on Cold War deterrence: Minemen played a crucial role in maintaining US naval readiness in the Pacific, particularly in light of the ongoing Vietnam War. - Minemen were part of the Weapons Department, Mine Division, Minemen worked together with Aviation Ordnancemen (AO) and Gunner Mate Tech (GMT) rates.

Leisure:

- Liberty in Atsugi and beyond: When off duty, Minemen could explore the surrounding areas, experiencing Japanese culture firsthand. The bustling city of Yokohama and the scenic beauty of Mount Fuji were popular destinations. The base itself also offered various recreational activities, including bowling alleys, movie theaters, and sports facilities.

- Cultural exchange: Opportunities to interact with the local population were plentiful, fostering cultural understanding and appreciation. Some Minemen learned basic Japanese, tried traditional cuisine, and even participated in local festivals. This exposure to a different way of life could be enriching and eye-opening. - Impact on personal lives: Despite the leisure opportunities, the distance from family and friends could be emotionally taxing. Many Minemen relied on letters, phone calls, and care packages to maintain connections back home.

Cultural immersion:

- Post-war Japan: Japan in 1969-1970 was still recovering from the devastation of World War II. The country was undergoing rapid economic growth and modernization, presenting a fascinating contrast to the military world of the base. Witnessing this transformation firsthand could be a valuable learning experience.

2024 Sea Mineman of the Year

MNI(SW) David J. Hernandez Operations Departmental Leading Petty Officer USS SENTRY (MCM 3)

Petty Officer Hernandez was born in San Diego, California but grew up in Tahoka, Texas. After graduating from Tahoka High School in 2007, he worked as a phlebotomist at Covenant Hospital and attended Texas Tech University as a freshman, before enlisting in January of 2010.

Upon graduating from boot camp he completed Apprentice Technical Training Schools in Great Lakes, IL prior to transferring to Mineman A-School in San Diego, CA. After completing A-School, then MNSN Hernandez reported to MCM Crew Swerve stationed onboard USS Devastator, San Diego, CA. During his time onboard USS Devastator, MNSN Hernandez attended Voyage Management System, Precise Integrated Navigation System schools and advanced to Petty Officer 3rd Class.

n 2012, he was forward deployed to Bahrain, to serve onboard USS Gladiator with MCM Crew Swerve. During an eleven-month deployment, MN3 Hernandez completed multiple basic and advanced qualifications, obtained the Enlisted Surface Warfare Specialist Pin and advanced to Petty Officer 2nd Class. Following his rotation back to San Diego, CA reporting to USS Champion, he participated in the heavy lifting evolution of transferring four MCM' s to Bahrain. After the disbanding of rotational crews, MN2 Hernandez reported to USS Devastator in Bahrain as a leading maintenance man for 0!01 work center in Operations Department in 2013.

Due to the declining health of his mother, MN2 Hernandez reported to South West Regional Maintenance Center in San Diego, Ca in 2015 to help provide bed side care during his off duty time for his mother, whom suffered from stage 4 terminal cancer. MN2 Hernandez repaired fiber optic cables for USS Carl Vinson, repaired numerous circuit cards for several warships increasing mission readiness through Pacific Fleet, and improved the training program during his tenure in the 2M shop at SWRMC.

In 2019, MN2 Hernandez reported to USS SENTRY stationed in Bahrain, as the Small Arms Munitions Instructor (SAMI) and serving as Deck Leading Petty Officer. As LPO, he demonstrated exceptional leadership and motivation, qualifying in boat davit, VHS, stem crane and anchor windlass operator leading to his qualification as Petty Officer in Charge. He then transferred to Combat division serving as LPO and was designated as Combat Information Center Watch Officer and advanced to Petty Officer 1st Class. Afterwards, he transferred to Armory division as LPO and qualified as Anti-Terrorism Tactical Watch Officer, while accounting for 100% of all articles of ammunitions and weapons for USS Sentry. MNI Hernandez completed his Bachelors of Arts in Psychology as an honors student in March of 2024. Currently, he is working towards his Conning Officer gualification and is serving as Operations Department Leading Petty Officer.

His personal awards include: Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal (6 awards); Navy Good Conduct Award (4 awards); and various other unit and campaign awards. MNI Hernandez is currently working on his package for his consideration for the Medical Enlisted Commissioning Program (MECP) and his application for several Nursing school programs throughout the United States.

MN1 has continuously excelled as one of the main pillars in the Mine Shop performing as Quality Assurance Leading Petty Officer (LPO). He supervises three Quality Assurance Safety

Observers (QA/SO), responsible for finalizing the quality and conditions of various Exercise and Training (ET) materials. handling and laying mines. as-well-as their respective components and piece parts. in support of fleet wide mine warfare exercise (MIW) operations.

As the lead SLMM Technician. he led a team during SLMM ET 2023 event hosted in Seal Beach. His team was composed of 10 Sailors from NMCPAC Unit Seal Beach. Five representatives from ISEA, two from COMOMAG, and one Sailor fom NMCPAC Guam resulting in the successful build of four MK 67 AUR's for INDOPACOM leadership to view, familiarize, and best utilize in future OPLANS complimenting a robust weapons cadre.

MK 62/63/65 Underwater Mine Asembly Team Leader and NMPAC Unit Seal Beach Command Duty Officer (CDO). Born on December 17th 1995 in the town of Huntsville. TX to father Rogelio Vargas Jr and mother, Linda Vargas. He graduated from Huntsville High School in 2014. MN1 Vargas spent majority of his adolescence playing baseball. football. running sprints and long distance for the varsity track team. Upon graduating from high school. he accepted a position as a Detentions Officer for the Walker County Sheriff's Department's Jail Division where he worked between processing and high security. He married Lyric and have a daughter born to him. Lyla Bell.

Leaving his hometown behind him. MN1 Vargas joined the Navy in 2015. and reported to his first command, USS Patriot (MCM 7) in April of 2016. In 2017. he earned the rank of MN3 in his time onboard PATRIOT while being SLQ-48 technician and pilot. and took over as LPO for Combat Information Center (CIC) during his final 6 months on board. In January of 2020. he reported to the T2Q department of LCSRON 1 and transferred to LCS Crew 215 assigned to USS TULSA (LCS 16) where he earned the rank of MN2. His time on board USS TULSA was cut short due to an injury. He used his physical set back as a way to better his career by gaining knowledge of mission planning. MCM watch floor operations. and familiarization with tactics to be an effective leader while LIMDU at MCMGRU3 for 16 months. He reported to NMCPAC CWD Unit Seal Beach in August of 2022. immediately took over as Submarine Launched Mobile Mine (SLMM) LPO. eventually became Production LPO and earned the rank of MN1 in June 2023. He is currently the Quality Assurance LPO at building 78.

He attended Recruit Training Command in Great Lakes, Illinois, in 2014. He then attended


Mineman "A" School in Point Loma, California. His early assignments included MCM DET 22

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

Walter Kent Bynum (Oklahoma City, Oklahoma), who passed away at the age of 69, on February 10, 2025








