

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

We need to elevate mine countermeasures as a full war fighter equal to other systems, whether its aircraft, submarines or surface ships. Mines are "show stoppers" capable of foiling amphibious operations. (the new organic remote mine hunting system prototype is on the home page) Use of SH-60 helicopters to perform AMCM duties from DDGs and CGs is under review. Dolphins are still being used for mine locating. A new AMCM concept using light pulses into the water for mine detection has been tested. Australia is planning a new programmable bottom mine, a stand-off mine and a sub launch mobile mine.


