





First Submarine?

Submitted by Lyal Stryker Sitting near the Barcelona Aquarium is a full scale model of the submersible ICTINEO 2 built and operated over 130 years ago. The first ICTINEO made its first dive in 1859 and the second completed in 1866. The two subs completed over a thousand dives to depths of over 80 meters with duration's up to 20 hours. The submersible (called an underwater ship) had lateral thrusters, a manipulator arm, optical ports, submersible lighting devices for viewing. It had its own air purification system.

Courier 9/11 team of Coastal Systems Station scientists and engineers participated in recovery efforts of SwissAir crash site. Their torpedo-like towed device contains high technology side-scan sonar that is capable of producing high resolution images of the ocean floor. The system uses dual frequencies to detect and classify objects suspended in the water column, as well as those that may be buried or partially buried on the ocean floor. The system con-

tains the latest technology in Electro-

optics laser systems.

xercise MARCOT/Unified Spirit '98 took place off Newfoundland in June. Five advanced concept technology programs were demonstrated during the mine countermeasures phase of the exercise. Skinner Executive Director. NCCS summarized the success. "Each system we deployed worked extremely well and the fleet representatives were amazed at he ease with which these systems functioned". Three of the Navy's most advanced minehunting sensors were deployed. These sensors and signal processors offer the Navy an inexpensive upgrade to the Remote Minehunting System. Deep water and very shallow water tow bodies provide classification of mine and mine-like targets. The tow platform is an un-manned radio controlled snordiesel-powered semikeling, submersible vehicle. It is capable of speeds up to 16 knots with an endurance of 24 hours at 8 knots. Dolphin has been tested successfully in the Persian Gulf as a tow platform for other minehunting platforms.



COMOMAG

By CDR Ron Swart easons Greetings from CO-MOMAG. We all wish you all the happiest of holidays. There is change in the wind throughout the Mine Warfare Forces and I'd like to update you on some of them.

- It is my sad duty to report the loss of one of our young Mineman, MN3 Michael R. Gibson, who lost his life this past November in a forklift accident at MOMAU 14, Yorktown, Va. We mourn his loss and pass our deepest sympathy to his wife, Kim and his parents David and

Claudia Gibson of Dodge City, KS.

- As the Mineman rating expands from around 450 to over 800, (at the same time as the Navy is experiencing severe manning shortages and a difficult recruiting environment) we are having to do our job with fewer people. Senior personnel who were rolling from sea to shore were diverted to recruiting, leaving our MO-MAU's with vacant billets. Some of our Units are now down to one To address this problem, COMINEWARCOM has invited the detailers to Texas to put together a plan that will get us our fair share of new people into the Mineman rate, to solve the female MN problem (currently they can't go to sea), and to capture the Minemen filling out of rating jobs and get them back inside the lifelines. I expect that we will see improvement in all three areas but it will require close supervision to keep us mission ready.

- Some of you may heard that there is a plan to reduce the number of MOMAU's. Well you heard right. As we retire our most labor intensive mine systems, we will require fewer sites to build and maintain the remaining Quickstrike mines. Under consideration is a plan to consolidate the three East Coast units into one at Yorktown. This proposal is based on good business, since we essentially pay the same landlord for these three sites. It looks like we'll have to close Det 7 Hawaii in the not too distant future since they'll be losing Mine Mk 67(SLMM), their main battery. Unit 12, Misawa may shrink to Detachment status to match their current manning. We're working on a plan to get Unit 15 moved from Kingsville, TX to Ingleside, TX where their customer base is. Unit 8, Guam, Unit 10, Okinawa and Unit 5, Sigonella will remain unchanged for the most part. After COMINEWARCOM approves the plan, it will be forwarded to CIN-CLANTFLT for the green light. Even then it could take several years to get everything moving since the Navy manpower system requires us to hit many wickets

along a long and winding road.

- What is ahead for mines and mining? Glad you asked. Our resourse sponsor at CNO N852, the Program Office at PMS-407, Coastal Systems Station, Panama City and COMINEWARCOM-COMOMAG have begun to develop a "Marketing Plan" with the goal of moving sea mining into the 21st Century. Currently funded is the Improved Sub-Launched Mobile Mine (ISLMM), a mine for deeper water now called Littoral Sea Mine (LSM) and a new Target Detecting Device (Firing Mechanism) TDD-71 with remote control. A stand off "glide-in" capability for mines is being investigated as well. Whatever future mines are developed will have to fill a fleet identified need that cannot be addressed as inexpensively or in any other way.

- Since the last report, CWO3 Gary Riggins assumed command of MO-MAU 12, Misawa; Master Chief Harold "Sonny" Benton retired to Florida; CNO said yes to CINCPACFLTs request to keep a small quantity of SLMM maintenanced and ready for the next five years; Master Chief John Nolen got married: Lt Ed Barrios transferred from COMOMAG staff to Unit 8 Guam as the XO: MN1 Gordon Harvey retired to the Corpus Christi area; Gunner John Godwin, XO MOMAU 8 retired from active duty; LCDR Tim Paton, my stalward acting XO and full time Planning/ Requirements Officer reminded me that he has been doing a great job and would like to see is name in print; Lt Carmina Towe, Training and Reserve Officer left active duty and is joining the reserves in Dayton, OH. She will continue to affiliate with COMOMAG and help us with our Naval Reserve program (thank goodness!). - Up next: COMOMAG will host a

CO's Conference for all MOMAU/ MOMAD bosses the week of February 22. COMINEWARCOM will have a change of command 19 February aboard USS Inchon. RADM Dennis Conley will be relieved by RADM Jose Betancourt, (BIO attached). (Ed note. Couldn't break the attachment) see next issue) USS Inchon Battle Group sails for the Mediterranean and the Arabian Gulf this Spring accompanied by four MCM ships. We have our work cut out for us in the months ahead. My goal is to keep MOMAG and the Mineman rating at the cutting edge. Thanks


Letters
