Let me also thank Toby at this time for all the effort he put into completing the required paperwork for submission to the IRS in pursuit of our 502 (C) (3) tax exempt status.


The AOM voted to donate a copy of the History Book to the Royal Danish Navy Library, in the name of Joergen Lorenzen.

T Coral Lee Mac Intosh was born in Schenectady, New In August 1976, she York enlisted in the Navy and was ordered to RTC, Orlando, Florida to attend Recruit Training.

In March 1977, LT Mac Intosh our intrepid Mineman and USS Seat- graduated from Mineman "A" School and reported to her first duty station, Commander, Mobile Mine Assembly Group, Charleston, South Carolina, where she was assigned tours at Mobile Mine Assembly Group, Detachment FIVE, Sigonella, Sicily, Mobile Mine Assembly Group, Detachment SIX, Souda Bay, Crete and Mobile Mine Assembly Group, Detachment FOUR, Glen Douglas,

March 1980, she was transferred to Navy Recruiting District, Albany, New York for a tour as a Navy Recruiter. In June 1983, she was transferred to Fleet and Mine Warfare Training Center where she attended the Test Training Center, Ingleside, Texas Upon graduation, in October 1983, she received orders to Commander, Mobile Mine Assembly Group, Charleston. South Carolina as a first class petty officer and performed staff duties as the Assistant Operations Officer for Logistics, the Assistant Operations Officer for Quality Assurance and Facilities, and the Assistant 'Operations Officer for Maintenance. Additionally, while assigned to Commander, Mobile Mine Assembly Group, she deployed to Mobile Mine Assembly Group, Detachment SIX, Souda Bay, Crete and returned to serve as Assistant to the Operations Officer. In September 1985, while attached to the Fleet and Mine Warfare Training center, she was advanced to Chief Mineman, the first female in the Navy to do so, and performed duties as an instructor, course supervisor and administrative chief.

On 1 February 1989, LT Mac Intosh was commissioned under the Limited

Duty Officer Program and became the first female LDO in the surface ordnance field. She then assumed duties as the Repair-5 Division Officer onboard USS JASON (AR 8). In June 1990, she was transferred to Shore Intermediate Maintenance Activity, San Francisco, California and served as Repair-Treasure Island and Repair-1 Division Officer. April 1993 she was assigned to Mobile Mine Assembly Group, Unit ONE as Prospective Commanding Officer, and became the Mine Community's first female Commanding Officer of a Mobile Mine Assembly Group Unit in June 1993.

In July of 1996, following a successful Commanding Officer tour at MOMAG Unit One, she transferred to Commander, Mine Warfare Inspection Group where she served as the Mine Preparation Inspector and Department Head until the command disestablished, May 30, 1997.

since June of 1997 as the Mine Systems Division Officer and has recently been selected for LCDR.

LT Mac Intosh has been awarded the Navy Commendation Medal, Navy Achievement Medal with Gold Star in lieu of Third Award, Meritorious Unit Commendation with two bronze stars, Navy "E" Ribbon, Good Conduct Medal with one bronze star, National Defense Service Medal, Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal, Sea Service Ribbon with two bronze stars. and the Navy Recruiting Ribbon.

LT Mac Intosh is married to Paul Francis Appleton. They have one son, Kyle and currently reside in Corpus Christi, Texas. She awaiting orders to Hawaii and will be transferring in December.??

ooops... Lost in the cracks of the Summer issue. A continuation of CDR Lyal Stryker's article on Civic Affairs on The Annual USS Hobson Memorial Ceremony in Charleston SC.

I was privileged to represent the AOM on your behalf. Also present was VADM Albert J. Baciocco, USN (RET), last years guest speaker and other Navy League members. Also AOM member Capt Ted Pstrak, USN (PET). The MOMAU 11 color guard paraded the colors and looked real sharp.

Everyone commented on their appearance and performance. The color guard was composed of MN1 Jody Wilbanks, USN, MN1 Dean Vencsel, USN and MN2 Dale Pollitt, USN. The USS Hobson, DMS 26 was sunk in the North Atlantic while acting as plane guard for the USS Wasp when the Wasp collided with the Hobson. There were 176 men that lost their lives in this tragic accident in which the ship sank in four minutes. One of our own, MN3 George Swan was lost in the accident. The keel for the USS Hobson DD-464 was laid at Charleston Navy Yard on 14 November, 1940, launched 8 September 1941 and Commissioned 22 January 1942. She served with distinction in the European theatre before returning to Charleston where she was converted to a High Speed Minesweeper and deployed to the Pacific. She participated in the battle for Okinawa and was heavily damaged on 16 April, 1945 where four members lost their lives.



#### Minemen of the future

All Hands 9/99

The year is 2004. Its 0-dark -30 and a Navy battle-group steams quietly along in a 21st century theater of operations. Mineman 1st Class Mike manta, lead operator on the embarked mine warfare fleet introduction team sits at a console in the command information center (CIC) aboard the battle group's forward destroyer.

With a confidence born of years of experience, Manta points to the console's sonar screen and explains the contact to the tactical action officer (TAO): a moored mine some 15 nautical miles ahead of the ship, detected by the ship's remote minehunting vehicle (RMV)

With lightning speed, Manta types commands into the console's keyboard. The RMV makes a sweeping turn around the contact. Seconds later verification of the moored mine against the computer database is complete. Location marked. The destroyer passes its findings along electronically to the battle group commander. A decision is made to avoid the mine rather than expend a neutralization device, knowing that the dedicated mine force will be along later to neutralize the threat.

This time it was only an exercise mine. Next time, as Manta well knows, it could be the real thing.

Sound like science fiction? Well, maybe, but its really not that far away. In this decade alone, the Navy has done more to advance mine warfare technology than in its entire history.

"For the most part, the image of the mine as a cheap weapon that floats on the surface with pointy horns is no longer valid" RADM Bentacourt, Commander Mine Warfare Command, cautions. "The sophistication and proliferation of today's mines has moved forward, but there are many unsophisticated mines still out there that pose a significant threat to Navy ships".


