AOM for the museum or for the auction we have at the Sunday picnic. I am studying (looking into) the application of "funds paid" by a member for "something" at the auction and have come to the conclusion that - whereas all is viewed as a contribution - only 50% of this could be deducted (since 1/2 of money raised goes to the scholarship fund - the other to operating funds). This gets a little "gray" here, since the member is receiving something "tangible". A broad interpretation and/or application would be that as long as you don't receive something "tangible" for your expense, you may deduct it.

I will be working with your Sec/ Treas, Curtis Christian on a postcard type acknowledgement the AOM will provide for contributions made. This is the law of the tax code. In the case of money provided for a specific fund or funds, the AOM will acknowledge with the amount included. By the code, we cannot provide any monetary value for 'goods" provided (such as for museum or auction) - that is the responsibility of the donor. I'm sure most of you have had this experience when donating goods to the NKF, Good Will, Salvation Army, etc. PLEASE HELP US OUT ON THIS when you are making what you consider to be a contribution/ donation, don't be shy - ASK FOR A RECEIPT. We won't be shy in telling you that, if applicable, such a contribution is not deductible within the meaning of the tax code.

Like I say, these are my interpretations. Don is one of those nitty-gritty guys when it comes to the allowable specifics, and I'm sure his further "rulings" will keep us on the straight and narrow. Hey, these are new grounds we are breaking, so have a little patience. If some of you out there have this knowledge via other organization participation, please let us know. NT aval history was made on USS Kingfisher in November becoming one of two coastal mine hunters to integrate women as permanent crew members. The 11 female crewmembers on board kingfisher participated fully in all watch stations and mine hunting operations including mine neutralization vehicle (MNV) piloting, crane operation, bomb buildup, sonar and radar operations, navigation, helmsman and engineering. MN2 Laura Rodriquez became the first Navv female to successfully pilot the MNV during a live "MP-2 shot" involving the deployment of a remotely detonated explosive bomblet designed to disable a mine laving on the sea floor. "The women have greatly exceeded my expectations for their training and deployment, and I am fully confident on the ability of our women to adapt to their new shipboard environment, This sip is fully capable of completing any assigned mission" said LCDR Michael A Hall, Kingfisher's CO.

MN2 Trina Randell was pictured under instruction in crane operation." Mission Package (MP) refers to the techniques of mine neutralization employed by the MP-1 involves the use of explosive cutter arms to break mooring chain or wire of moored mines so they surface for destruction. MP-2 is a bomblet that the ROV places in position at the bottom mine which is remotely detonated after the ROV and MCM vessel are clear.




Under the category of "everything



USS Heron MHC 52 to the rescue

Heron (MHC 52) received a relayed distress call from the Coast Guard Group in Corpus Christi. The Peggy Anne, a 49-foot fishing vessel, was disabled from a failed engine. The seas had swelled to eight feet: the Peggy Anne was forced to anchor in 60 feet of water six miles off shore.

The Heron crew, conducting a mine hunting exercise 50 miles off shore, responded to the call with all engines ahead full. Making her way through the on setting cold front, the Heron reached the stranded vessel within three hours of initial hail.

LCDR Anthony Krueger, Heron's commanding officer, deemed that the situation required immediate action and that the crew of the coastal mine hunter would tow the fishing vessel to safety

Shot lines were let out to the stranded boat. The line, hauled in by the crew of the Peggy Anne, became hand taught. As the revolutions increased under tow, the line sang with the strain.

Heron, with vessel in tow. strugaled through the current and waves to the safety of the Port Aransas ietties. Five knots over around and eight knots of current tensioned the line beyond its limits. The Peggy Anne's tow line snapped and the vessel was set adrift 100 vards east of the jetties. Heron made several dramatic and heroic maneuvers to recover the stranded vessel, to no avail. With the majority of the rescue completed, the Coast Guard was able to brave the last hundred yards to bring the vessel to safety. USS Heron is homeported at Naval Station Ingleside, Texas.

Sep '99 All Hands

By remote surveillance cameras on the fantail, the Mineman (MN) in CIC observed the ships crane being utilized to lower the \$2 million remote-operated mine neutralization vehicle, Shania, into the rolling sea. "Forty-eight pilot," rang the tactical action officer's (TAO) voice in the Mineman's headset. "We have a contact bearing one-eight-five; range 225 yards; possible mine-like object. You have permission to take control of the vehicle." responding 'Aye Aye Sir," the MN takes the pilot stick in hand and taps it forward sending the hovering MNV into a 45 degree dive. "Flying the MNV through the turbulent, murky undercurrent toward a mine like target is comparable to executing aerial maneuvers in a cockpit. Piloting isn't a solo act. The success of seek and destroy is a combined effort of all hands on board.

First priority is to put some distance between the ship and the ROV. "Vehicle is 50 yards from the ship, request permission to commence mine hunting evolution" is passed to the bridge. Data on the console monitor allows the MN to

Mine Battery Disposal Foc'sle 3/3/00 by Frank Gregory

Minemen throughout the world often wonder what happens to all those environmentally hazardous mercury and cadmium mercury batteries that are turned in for disposal. Recent changes to the stockpile have greatly increased the quantities available for disposal. Commercial sources for disposal of batteries does not exist and storage environmental of them poses The Navy found itself problems. with over 140 tons of mercury batteries and another 40 tons of cadmium mercury batteries awaiting The Mercury Battery disposal. Disposal Facility, Naval Undersea Warfare Center, Hawthorne, NV Detachment performs controlled environment battery recycling and disposal.

As part of the disposal process. the recovery of expensive materials is also realized. Recovery of large amounts of silver from silver oxide propulsion batteries from Mine MK 67 (SLMM) and Torpedo MK 37. The silver plates in these batteries have returned \$2,850,000 worth of silver to the navy's stockpile. The negative battery plates, which are zinc amalgamated with mercury, present the same difficulties and liabilities for disposal as hazardous material. The old system of using an oven to melt down batteries became obsolete as batteries became more complex in design and formulation. An extensive study was conducted and a new plan for recovery was put in place. It was determined that freezing batteries with nitrogen, crushing and shredding them and then separating the chemicals would do Their basic process the trick. depending on the type of battery was freeze, crush, shred and bake.

A retort oven, which transforms material by heat and vacuum is then started. The retort process heats the mercury containing material under a vacuum to high temperatures in order to convert the mercury into a gas. Using a vacuum system the process directs the gas flow from the oven into collection tanks. It takes about 10 hours to heat the oven to 700 degrees Fahrenheit and another eight hours to remove the mercury and another two for controlled cooling.

Hawthorne's existing oven is being modified to meet the Navy's need and is expected to become operational in March 2000.

This process was developed for the disposal of mine batteries. However, there is potential to use it for other types of batteries within DOD. Torpedo batteries are laden with silver. The Air Force has inquired about retorting their mercury batteries. Once operational, this process has potential application through technology transfer into commercial markets.

Once in operation the following batteries are scheduled for the process: Dry Silver-Zinc Battery MK 46, Wet Silver-Zinc MK 53, MK 135 series, MK 95, 117, 130, 131, and 141 series. The backlog should be eliminated by the end of 2002.


When Tomorrow Starts Without Me




