Mining Haiphong

By Don DeCrona

Can you remember where you were on 9 May 1972, when we mined North Vietnam? I

was stationed in Vietnam as an Advisor with the Brown Water Navy. I was so happy when I heard of the mining operation, and later to brief RADM Wilson on how we, the Mine Force, prepared for this operation. The following is taken from the book, "A Better War."

Beginning 9 May all the major North Vietnamese ports were mined. It took only a minute, literally, for nine Navy aircraft off the Coral Sea, roaring in at 400 knots only 400 feet off the deck, to put 36 Mk 52 mines — huge magnetic things weighing 1,100 pounds and packing 625 pounds of high explosives — in at Haiphong, the first target hit and North



TOM BEATTY SOME THOUGHTS ON HIS PASSING

By CDR Ron Swart e received the sad news that Thomas Johnny Beatty died of a heart attack on October 5, 1999. Tom was known as Mr. Mine Warfare to those of us in the Mine Warfare Community. No other person worked longer or harder for the betterment of Mine Warfare in the U.S. Navv than did Tom. The following is a partial list of his many tours and duties related to Mine Warfare: (Assistant Chief of Staff at COMINEWARCOM for NATO and including his Allied Plans, appointment as Head of the US Delegation to the following events: NATO Mine Warfare Conference, NATO Mine Warfare Working Party, NATO ACLANT Mine Warfare Conference, Mediterranean NATO MW Conference (MENACE). Commander and Chief Staff Officer of the Mobile Mine Assembly Group, Chief Staff Officer of the Mine Warfare Inspection Group. Chief of Staff for Amphibious Flotilla 7, Commanding Officer of an MSC, Advisor to the South Vietnamese Army, Hard hat diver on Submarine Rescue Ship Skylark While attached to the Inspection Group, Tom began conducting training missions to various allied Navies. He continued this role during subsequent tours and made four missions to Saudi Arabia, one to Malaysia, and two to Indonesia. He developed a variety of Mineman courses for the allies. When the Suez was mined in 1984, If I have neglected to thank anyone, Tom went to Cairo to serve as the Officer for COMNAVCNET and commanded Clare and I are looking forward to Mine Countermeasures operations seeing each and every one of you in for the RH-53D helicopters clearing Jidda. At the outbreak of the Tanker War, Tom went to the Persian Gulf and flew in the helicopter that made the first visual sightings of mines in the approaches to Kuwait City. He was viewed among the NATO and

One of Tom's dreams was to establish a Mine Warfare Enlisted Community that maintained mines ashore and performed Mine Countermeasures His vision inspired the expansion of the Mineman rating after DESERT STORM, and Tom lived to see that dream come true. After finally really retiring, Tom continued working as a contractor on Mine Warfare tactical decision aids. We owe Tom Beatty a great debt for his outstanding contributions to the important discipline of Mine Warfare at a time when being identified as a Mine Warfare type was neither personally rewarding nor advantageous for ones career. Tom is survived by his wife Jean and sons, Bryan and Stephen.

TOM BEATTY CAREER NOTES

By Dave Belton om entered the Navy at the age of 17 in either 1949 or 1950. His first duty station was Presidential Yacht, Williamsburg. He used to tell the story that on a cold winter morning he had the watch topside. Harry Truman came up for a breath of fresh air and noticed that Tom was cold. He told Tom to go down and get a warm cup of coffee. Tom told the President that he couldn't

because he as on watch. Tom said that the President said "You go on down and get your coffee. Tell them that Harry has the watch." was a hard hat diver and served on the Submarine Rescue Ship Skylark. He was also Commanding Officer of an MSC. He served in Vietnam as an Advisor to the South Vietnam Army. He received a Purple Heart and Bronze Star with combat V for that tour. He also served as Chief of Staff for Amphibious Flotilla 7 prior to coming to the Mine Warfare Inspection Group as Chief of Staff in 1977. Tom served with the inspection Group until about 1980. He went to Commander, Mobile Mine Assembly Group (COMOMAG), where he served as both Chief Staff Officer and Commander. He left COMOMAG in 1983 to become ACOS for NATO/Allied Plans at COMINEWARCOM. He retired in July 1986 and was immediately recalled to active duty. He retired again in July 1988 and was again recalled to active duty. He finally retired for good in July 1990.

While attached to the Inspection Group. Tom began conducting training missions to various Allied Navies. He continued this role while attached to COMOMAG and COMINEWARCOM. The missions usually lasted about six weeks in country. There were at least four such trips to Saudi Arabia, one to Malaysia, and two to Indonesia. He developed Mineman Electrician, Mineman Boatswain, and Mineman Engineman courses for the Saudis. When the Suez Crisis broke out in 1984, Tom went to Cairo to serve as the Mine Warfare Officer for COMNAVCENT. He provided Mine Warfare expertise to the Admiral. During this time he also commanded a four-helicopter detachment which was assigned to clear Jidda, Saudi During the Tanker War, Tom went to Kuwait and flew in the first helicopter to discover mines (visually) in the approaches to

From 1983 until 1989, Tom acted as head of the US Delegation to the NATO Mine Warfare Conference, NATO Mine Warfare Working Party, NATO ACLANT Mine Warfare MENACE Conference, and (Mediterranean NATO MW Conference), each of which met annually. Tom was viewed in both NATO and Allied Navies as being the most knowledgeable Mine Warfare Officer in the Free World. Tom also accompanied Rear Admirals Home, Cockfield, Tobin, and Mathis on Mine Warfare visits to Navies in both Europe and on the While Pacific Rim. COMINEWARCOM, Tom received two Legions of Merit.

One of Tom's dreams was to establish a Mine Warfare Enlisted community that maintained mines ashore and performed Mine Countermeasures at sea. His vision inspired the expansion of the Mineman rating after DESERT STORM, and he lived to see this dream come true.

Since retiring, **Tom** worked for several defense contractors. He conceived the idea of MEDAL, which is the only authorized Tactical Decision Aid for Mine Warfare in the U.S. Navy, and forms the basis for the integration of Mine Warfare's Command and Control with the rest of the Navy. MEDAL is expected to be the standard for Mine Warfare for many years to come.

Vietnam's most important seaport. Over successive days the lesser ports were sowed, with all mines set to activate at 9 a.m. on 12 May. "It took us eight years to get permission" to mine Haiphong harbor, said Admiral Moorer, Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. "Afterward not one ship entered or left the harbor until we took up the mines." (page 327)

As part of the agreement the U.S. Navy swept the mines from Haiphong harbor, thereby, releasing a flotilla of ships that had been bottled up in the port for three hundred days. Not a single vessel had entered or left since the one decisive minute in which the blockading mines were laid. (page 362)

Ray Cobis replied:

We were on Guam hauling 1500 tons of bombs a day for the Air force to drop on our friends up north

Bill Roberts replied:

I sure do remember where I was on 9 May 1972. I was serving with JUSMMAT, as Minewarfare Advisor to the Turkish Navy, stationed at Golcuck Turkey. My counter parts had lots of questions, however, at that time all of the details we had on the mining of Haiphong came from the Stars and Stripes.

Joe Balderrama replied:

Just finished running the river's in Vietnam. I WAS on recruiting duty in Colorado.

Cecil Martin replied:

I was an Instructor at NSMW teaching "B" School Electronics and Black Box and in the process of being relieved by MNC Red Niederberger as I was to be promoted to WO 1 on the 1st of June, 72.

John Iwaniec says:

I was just finishing up "A" school, thought for sure I was heading that way to be a gunner on a PBR. Couldn't understand why I was going

through "A school for mines when I heard Minemen were shooting fifty Cals, on boats in the Delta, ha! I graduated first in my class, so my reward was to be put on the Sand Blaster at COMOMAG. None of my classmates and I don't think any following classes went to Nam, I wonder what year they stopped sending Minemen over there, do any of you wiser older folks know.

Cecil Martin responds:

I don't know when the last MN went to PBRs but do know that a few served as advisors to the Vietnamese after the boats were turned over to the VN Navy. The only enlisted Minemen that I know of to go to PBRs were MN1/MNC and were assigned as Boat Captains/Patrol Officers, when we still had the boats, and as advisors after the turnover.

Those that I remember to have been assigned to PBRs in some capacity were; MN1 William Williams, MN1/MNC Timothy Rogers, MN1 Cecil Martin, MN1 H. Ross Maddox, MN1 Shelly Kelly, MN1 Sal Carvajal, MN1 Sellers, MN1 Joe Balderrama, MN1 Bob "Willie" Wilson and somebody told me one time that MN1 "Germ" Kennedy was also assigned to PBRs but I don't know that for sure.

As mentioned in the original email that started of all this, at least one MN LDO was assigned to the Brown Water Navy as an advisor.

Other MN were assigned to Billeting in Saigon; MN1 Jasper Kennedy, MN1 Bob Stancik, and another was assigned in Country but don't know in what capacity; MN2?) Ted Rutt.

Others served in EOD; MNCM Paul Henry, MN1 Bradfield, MN2 Frank Marshall and possibly others.

I don't believe we had any MN SEALs.

Very many served in ships on Yankee Station and some were in country TAD with the DST 115. I Don't know if anyone did anything in country with the "P" or if it was even used.

John Iwaniec responds:

Wow, what great info, I was surprised by some of the names you mentioned, the only guys I knew who served on the PBRs were you, Ross Maddox and Jose Balderrama. Here I've known a lot of those guys over the years but not much about their past. Thanks for the info.

Bob Hart says:

As you know we were all on Azuma Island when the call came for volunteers for the PBR's and as I recall, among all the First Class Minemen, Torpedomen, Enginemen, et al that put our names in the hat, only you and "Porky" Rogers were selected. As time went on and we were eventually separated, most of the people got into the fray. I went to NavMag Subic and in 1969 took a team aboard the USS Oriskany CV-34 and then cross decked to the USS Kitty Hawk CV-63. During that time, other First Class and Chiefs from all over the Far East were getting their turn at going to Yankee Station with their teams. team and I flew from the Oriskany to the Kitty Hawk when Oriskany left Yankee Station for R&R in Hong Kong, We were relieved on the Kitty Hawk by Emie Egelhoff and his team. I transferred from Subic in October 1969 to Instructor School in Norfolk and then to instructor duty at NSMW Charleston in Jan. 1970, I was instructing when the mines were planted in May 1972.

Proposed Amendments for the Bylaws of the Association of Minemen.

Last Amended in August, 1998

Proposed Bylaw Amendments

The AOM officially became a tax exempt organization under IRS tax code 501(c)(3); therefore, the Association bylaws are to be amended with an effective date of 13 December 1999. The Board of Directors submits the following proposed bylaw amendments to the members to be voted upon at the Annual General Business Meeting on August 12, 2000.

Article I NAME AND STATUS OF THE ORGANIZATION

Action: Delete the following wording from Section 3:

"The Association is also an exempt organization within the meaning of the Internal Revenue Code, being granted 501(c)(7) status on 20 November 1981."

Action. Add the following wording at the end of Section 3:

"The Association of Minemen is an exempt organization within the meaning of Internal Revenue Code 501(c)(3) effective 13 December 1999. The Association of Minemen corporation/organization is organized exclusively for charitable, educational, or scientific purposes within the meaning of Section 501 (c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (or corresponding section of any future Federal tax code)."

Article III BASIC POLICIES

Action. Add the following wording at the end of Section 2:

"No part of the net earnings of the corporation/organization shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributable

to its members, trustees, directors, officers or other private persons, except that the corporation/ organization shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of Section 501(c)(3) purposes. substantial part of the activities of the corporation/organization shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the corporation/ organization shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of or in opposition to any candidate for public office."

Action. Change Section 3 and 4 to read Section 4 and 5, respectively.

Action. Insert the following wording as the new Section 3.

"Section 3. Notwithstanding any other provision of these articles, the corporation/organization shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on (a) by a corporation/organization exempt from Federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (or corresponding section of any future Federal tax code) or (b) by a corporation/ organization: contributions of which are deductible under Section 170(c) (2) of the Internal Revenue Code (or corresponding section of any future Federal tax code). Upon dissolution of this corporation/organization, assets shall be distributed for one or more exempt purposes within the meaning of Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, i.e., charitable, educational, scientific (or corresponding section of any future Federal tax code), or shall be distributed to the Federal government, or to a state or local government for a public purpose. And perform such other duties applicable to the office as

prescribed by the parliamentary authority adopted by the Association."

ARTICLE VI DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Action. Delete the following wording from Section 4:

"In the event of dissolution of the Association of Minemen organization, the Treasurer shall cause permanent distribution of all organization assets to the USS Yorktown and the USS Lexington Mine Warfare Museums; an exempt organization within the meaning of Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code."


Action. Insert the following wording in Section 4 where the above wording was deleted:

"Upon dissolution of this corporation/organization, assets shall be distributed for one or more exempt purposes within the meaning of Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, i.e., charitable, educational, scientific (or corresponding section of any future Federal tax code), or shall be distributed to the Federal government, or to a state or local government for a public purpose."
