Hello Shopmate Curtis;

This week is my anniversary- 6 May 58 years ago I was surrendered by the Army on Corregidor, after my ship, USS Tanager (AM-5) was sunk in Manila Bay, 62 years ago today, I ioined the Navy in Houston, TX.

I am enjoying the Dashpot However, there are very few names that I still know as the old timers die off.

Under Taps listing: Don DeForest was listed as a CDR ? If I remember he retired as a correctly, "Tombstone Capt." I was stationed on Indian Island Annex (IIA), Bangor 1958-1960 as Mine Division Officer. Capt. Don DeForest, USN Ret. visited IIA to dig clams, where we met again.

I first met shipmate DeForest in Pearl Harbor in late 1940 - early 1941 when I attended Mine School there. He was a pin stripe Gunner under Lt. ???. "Foxy" Fisher was the Senior Gunners Mate Chief and number 3 on the school staff. I was on the Tanager, a flashing dashing SN 1st Class, (made GM3 1 May 1941) while working under 1st Class Gunnersmate Bartlet.

A few days later Tanager, Lark, Quail and Whipperwill departed for the PI to mine Subic and Manila Bay in the summer - fall of 1941. (3-4 months before Pearl Harbor)

I graduated in the top 5-10% in my class and was offered a transfer to the new mine school that was soon to open in Yorktown, VA.


I declined, as a hometown buddy had followed me into the Navy, requested my ship, Ogalala, got it, but in the meantime I was transferred to Tanagher, he requested Tanagher and got it also. I didn't want to separate from him after all the effort he had gone to serve with me.

Scholarship Scoop



## Development of Destructor Mk 36

What initiated and what was the time frame for development of the Destructor Mk 36? This might be a mote question, except for the fact that in early 1966, LCDR Ben Randle, Mines Officer for COMSERVPAC, visited West Loch and while working with personnel from MOMAT 0302, he discussed the concept to convert bombs into mines. LT Blas (Joe) Hernandez, USN, Ret. has mentioned this conversation in his writings on mining of Vietnam. Ben's conversation led Joe to believe that the need for the destructor was predicated upon a Vietnam mining operation that took place prior to Ben's visit to West Loch, where mines failed to arm in shallow water. No prior mining records can be located to confirm earlier mining operations in VN, however, if anyone knows of mining of VN waters prior to early 1966, please let us know

In the Fall 2000 issue of The Dashpot, LT George Russell, Jr. USN, Ret, and Jack Shreve, retired NAVSEA civilian Deputy PMS-407. both featured articles on mining and destructor operations in Vietnam. George's article noted the mining of VN during February- March 1967, were the first mines planted in enemy waters since WWII. Jack's article describes the first use of the Destructor Mk 36 in VN on June 20, 1967. For the development of the destructor, he credits Bud Rowzee at the Naval Ordnance Laboratory and Rudy Schuetzer at BUWEPS. The first weapons went into the water at Vinh only 10 months after the initiation of development was approved by CNO.

In order to determine more on the correlation between the first mining and first destructor use in VN, LCDR Don DeCrona, USN, Ret,

wrote Jack requesting more background on the development of the destructor. Approximately, three weeks later George wrote Jack a similar request. The following is a segment of Jack's reply to George and Don.

"Sometime in late 1965/early 1966, I was part of the mine office in BUWEPS, but we were physically tocated at NOL, White Oak, MD. We received a request from CINCPACFLT to develop an air laid mine that could be used on the inland waterways of Vietnam to target small craft, some of which were not even powered. Somewhere along the line it was suggested that a further use of such a mine would be against bridges and dams. One concept from PAC was a floating mine that could be planted upstream from bridges and dams and drift downstream until it struck something and exploded. Something the size of a basketball was envisioned.

We put together a team to propose ideas, estimate feasibility, prepare development plans, etc. Of course, PACFLT wanted it ASAP, which limited the complexity and development time. The floating concept was quickly discarded due to the inability to control where the mine would go off as it made its way down curving, shallow streams and rivers with sandbars. A sidelight: we couldn't find any maps of Vietnam or other information to show how deep the rivers were. So we contacted the Defense Intelligence Agency for help. They said sure we have all the info that you need. A visit to them, after all sorts of clearance and need-to-know red tape, revealed that all they had were some old Shell Oil Company road maps of Vietnam, which were useless for our purposes. The scary thing is, these were the best maps of VN in the intelligence community.

I don't remember the other concepts but **Charles** (**Bud**) **Rowzee** of **NOL** had been working on a thin film magnetometer sensing

device (something that was really high technology at the time) with the idea of fitting it into a standard bomb case (of which there was an unlimited supply in the Navy and Air Force). It had the further virtue of being compatible with every bomb-carrying aircraft and had the same aerial ballistic characteristics.

Dr. Gene Beach from NOL, CDR Bob Gideon (OPNAV minewarfare boss) and I took our various ideas to PACFLT, who concurred that the bomb/mine was the way to go.

From then on, it was full speed ahead at NOL, with NMEF assisting with the logistics aspects of the project. The official "go ahead" for the development was received from OPNAV in September 1966 and the first weapons were in the water in June 1967."

Rudy Schuetzler provided the additional comment.

"After the initial DST deployment, a project office was setup at BUWEPS to handle ongoing development and, mainly, production of the DST Mk 75 Kit. I was in that project office along with CDR Earl Roberts and others. Captain Don Hihn was head of the Mine Warfare Division at that time. The project office itself received very little information on DST deployments much less the use of other Mks and Mods. I don't recall the exact number of Kits that were produced but the production was, by far, the largest mine procurement ever and it is not likely to be topped ever again!!

Of interest perhaps is that the Air Force received many of the Kits and their use and deployment is another ball-game!!"

The new U.S Navy Battery Recycling Facility at the U.S.Army Depot in Hawthorne NV is up and running. The original study was reported in an earlier Dashpot. The project is now up and running full steam. The Navy has 150 tons of used mercury and silver batteries from mines to dispose of. Coastal Systems Station and others participated in the project. Battery disposal costs of \$3.6 million are avoided and recovery of \$1.8 million in precious metals each year is realized. The recovered metals are used in manufacturing new batteries. A recent procurement contract awarded for new batteries includes the use of 189,000 trov ounces of silver reclaimed by the facility. Using this reclaimed silver saved the Navy and ultimately taxpayers \$800,000.

Coastal Courrier 1/26/01

Mine sensors save manatees. Florida's giant manatees are curiously gentle sea creatures whiskered - slow moving and blubbery, distant sea relatives of elephants, with spatula-shaped tails, fingernail-tipped flippers and thick gray skin. The population is dwindling with a total of just over 2000. Deaths from disease. pollution, pleasure boat collisions and boat propeller wounds. A surprising number of deaths are caused because manatees have no fear of Florida's underwater canal gates and locks. Each year a significant number of manatees die after being crushed in the canal locks. The Navy is coming to their A system of acoustic sensors - originally developed by ONR for underwater mine detection - was fitted onto the gates and locks at Port Canaveral. Designed to stay open if a manatee is near them, the Port Canaveral gates now operate like garage doors, sensing in a tenth of a second if a manatee is nearby. The gates will not close until the creature passes by. During the first

five weeks of operation, the sensors detected seven manatees and saved them. Not a single manatee death caused by gate closings has been reported since the sonar devices were installed in March 2000. The goal is to outfit all of Florida's gates and locks fitted with these simple sensors says the project engineer affiliated with Florida's Manatee Protection System.



INGLESIDE, Texas — The four ships of Mine Warfare Readiness Group 3 (MIWRG-3) departed Naval Station Ingleside, Texas, Thursday, 15 Feb., for a six-month deployment that will take them through the Panama Canal to the Pacific Ocean and U.S. West Coast.

The mine countermeasures ships USS Avenger (MCM 1), USS Chief (MCM 14), USS Devastator (MCM 6), and USS Scout (MCM 8) will participate in a number of naval exercises during the deployment including Exercise Kernel Blitz 01, a joint exercise conducted March 19 -April 8 off the coast of Southern California. Capt. Richard Rush, Commander. Mine Countermeasures Squadron Two, based in Ingleside, will spearhead mine warfare efforts during the exercise.

In addition to participating in a number of training exercises, the nearly 320 Sailors aboard the four MCM's will enjoy port visits along the U.S. West Coast, and Canada. The ships are scheduled to participate in the Portland, Ore., Rose Festival in June, and make several port visits, including stops in San Diego and San Francisco, Calif., and Victoria, Columbia, Cananda. On the return trip, the ships plan to make stops in Punta Arenas, Costa Rica, and Grand Cayman, British Virgin Islands, before returning to their Ingleside, Texas, homeport Aug. 8.

These ports will be interesting," explained Damage Controlman Third Class William Botterbush, a three-year Navy veteran from St. Louis. Botterbush, who works in CHIEF's engineering department. said that leaving his family and friends in Ingleside will be tough, "But they know I'll be back."

The four Avenger-class ships are designed as a mine hunter-killer capable of finding, classifying and destroying moored and bottom mines. The 224-foot, 1,300-ton mine countermeasures ships are

equipped with a high definition, variable-depth sonar, and remotely operated, robotic submarine used to neutralize mines. It is also capable of conventional mine sweeping measures. The ship has a fiberglass-sheathed, wooden hull and is armed with two .50 caliber machine guns.

### Retirement Pay Restoration Act of 2001

(Concurrent receipt)

Two bills, House of Representative Bill, H.R. 303 and Senate Bill, S. 170, have been introduced in the 107th Congress.

House of Representatives Bill, H. R. 303, and Senate Bill, S. 170, are bills to amend Title 10, United States Code, to permit retired

members of the armed forces who have a service connected disability to receive both military retired pay by reason of their years of military service and to receive disability compensation from the Department of Veterans Affairs for their disability. That is, any member with sufficient service to be eligible for non-disability retirement (including Reserve retirees and disability retirees with at least 20 years of service) would be allowed to keep their military retired pay plus any disability compensation subsequently awarded by the VA. Both Bills have the short title: "Retirement Pay Restoration Act of 2001". Receipt of both retirement pay and VA disability compensation is commonly know as "Concurrent receipt".

Service Connected Military Retirees are the only persons singled out to waive one dollar of their retired pay for every dollar received in Department of Veterans Affairs Disability Compensation. No private industry workers, local civil servants, state civil servants, federal civil servants, nor appointed or elected officials are required to pay for their own disability compensation as they can draw their pensions and VA disability compensation without the dollar for dollar reduction in their retirement benefit.

These service connected disabled military retirees spent their lives, into middle age, in service to our country. They served with distinction dedication and honor around the world, many of them spending time in bloody battle. It is clearly unjust not to seize the opportunity to end the unfair practice of offsetting military retirement pay by the amount of VA disability pay. Those stipends are earned and awarded for entirely different purposes, yet current law ignores any distinction. This is a unique opportunity to show our gratitude to the remarkable men and women who have sacrificed so

much for this great country of ours by supporting the Retirement Pay Restoration Act of 2001.


In 2000, a similar bill passed the Senate before being dropped (because of funding concerns) during House/Senate conference action on the FY2001 Defense Authorization Act. All military and veterans associations will seek to build on last year's support, and will press the House and Senate Budget Committees to allocate the needed budget authority so this important legislation can be enacted this year.

Thanks to Bill Fortner

Today we mourn the passing of an old friend by the name of Common Sense. Common Sense lived a long life but died from heart failure at the brink of the millennium. No one really knows how old he was since his birth records were long ago lost in bureaucratic red tape.

He selflessly devoted his life to service in schools, hospitals, homes, factories and offices, helping folks get jobs done without fanfare and foolishness.

For decades, petty rules, silly laws and frivolous lawsuits held no power over Common Sense. He was credited with cultivating such valued lessons as to know when to come in out of the rain, the early bird gets the worm, and life isn't always fair.

Common Sense lived by simple,

sound financial policies (don't spend more than you earn), reliable parenting strategies (the adults are in charge, not the kids), and it's okay to come in second.

A veteran of the Industrial Revolution, the Great Depression, and the Technological Revolution, Common Sense survived cultural and educational trends including feminism, body piercing, whole language and "new math."

But his health declined when he became infected with the "If-it-only-helps-one-person-it's-worth-it" virus. In recent decades his waning strength proved no match for the ravages of overbearing federal regulation.

He watched in pain as good people became ruled by selfseeking lawyers and enlightened auditors. His health deteriorated when schools endlessly implemented tolerance policies, reports of six year old boys charged with sexual harassment for kissing a classmate and a teacher fired for reprimanding an unruly student. It declined even further when schools had to get parental consent to administer aspirin to a student but cannot inform the parent when the female student is pregnant or wants an abortion.

Finally, Common Sense lost his will to live as the Ten Commandments became contraband, churches became businesses, criminals received better treatment than victims, and federal judges stuck their noses into everything from Boy Scouts to professional sports.

As the end neared, Common Sense drifted in and out of logic but was kept informed of developments, regarding questionable regulations for asbestos, low flow toilets, "smart" guns, the nurturing of Prohibition Laws and mandatory air bags.

Finally when told that the homeowners association restricted exterior furniture only to that which

enhanced property values, he breathed his last.

Common Sense was preceded in death by his parents Truth and Trust; his wife, Discretion; his daughter, Responsibility; and his son, Reason. He is survived by three stepbrothers: Rights, Tolerance and Whiner.

Not many attended his funeral because so few realized he was gone.

COMOMAG logo date

Ed Oyer called a while back questioning the COMOMAG logo that appears in the Full Force news section of Dashpot. Joe Hernandez also asked us about the logo date in our newsletter. He remembered being in MOMAT 0321 formed from Mine Project Four at Yorktown; MOMAU 0322 was in Charleston. That was disestablished to start MOMAULANT in 1970 or 1971. He has correspondence signed by Hall Elston, COMOMAG in July 1971. Hal Elston joined in to say "I relieved LT Roger Janke as Commanding Officer, Mobile Mine Assembly Unit, Atlantic (MOMAULANT), reporting 28 Feb Commander Mine Forces, Atlantic Fleet became Commander Mine Warfare Forces on 1 July 1971 and I was transferred from CO. MOMINASULANT to CO, MOMAG effective that same date." CDR Ron Swart clarifies the logo date by stating that the logo did not mean to imply that MOMAG, COMOMAG or MOMAU didn't exist before 1 July 1975....that is when COMOMAG went world wide and for the first time, owned all the mine shops... was recommended by COMINEWARFOR to CNO and was approved. The MINEWARINSGRU stood up and COMINEWARFOR became COMINEWARCOM on the same date. In 1996 Ron also changed the Unit names from Mobile Mine Assembly Group Unit (MOMAGU xx) to Mobile Mine Assembly Unit (MOMAU xx) since AOM members dropped for non payment of dues.


