HISTORY

by "Bud" Rowzee

received a phone call from Bud Rowzee, retired design engineer. NOL White Oak concerning the DST article in the Spring issue of Dashpot. He wondered if we were interested in how it really got started.

Bud Says "My thoughts on designing a mine in order to be successful, it must utilize high production parts — modified to fit your needs.

The Anti Invasion Mine (the original bomb to mine concept) was introduced at the 1963? Lab Mine Conference. No interest shown.

Betty Gay & Joyce , lab personnel , introduced me to the MK 80 series bomb".

In 1966 reps from NAVSEA (Shreve, Gideon) and OPNAV met with NOL higher ups (Hightower and others) for a brainstorming session on mining inland waterways in Vietnam. Bud Rowzee was told to sit in and see if he could contribute. The session was going nowhere fast with multimillion development, long lead time proposals, etc. when Bud raised his hand and offered something that he had been working on for about two years. The conversion of General Purpose (GP) bombs into mines. Bud stated he could give them something for about \$600 per unit in 6 months. Bud had already worked on a 1/2 size search coil and MK 52 mine components that were to be placed in GP bombs. There were some already being tested in the York River. In a flash Bud was "on the team"

Bud went to the bomb people to discover the GP bombs (fat bodies) were all but gone from inventory. The MK 82 low drag bomb had replaced it When Bud saw the front and aft cavities on the MK 82 were soup-can size, he thought his "saving" project was dead

He was already working on a Thin Film Sensor (does not require a

search coil) The **Betty Gray** (?) bomb tests for MK 82s was in progress at the time. Within seven days available parts were rounded up and a new weapon was born. Using 15 to 20 years of munitions experience the team including the drafting room, came up with the MK 75 DST Kit. In the original design a screwdriver was included. The screwdriver was the only part that did not make the final design. The nomenclature was the Anti Invasion Mine

Bud has extensive detailed records about the history of the DST Program

What was most peculiar about this effort was there was no development funding, no think-tank school developing the concept or committee laboring over details or long-lead procurement. The DST was basically off the shelf components into high production. It was the first free-fall, land, sea

mine in history.

Editor response: **Buddy**, I thank you for your interest in the accuracy of our newsletter and Mine History. We are aging out on our history and want some of that information to be put down on paper now that It's not classified.

I was observing a Fleet Service Mine test at MOMAU One in Long Beach in the late 70's where Hawthorne civilians had built exercise MK 25 mines and shipped them to the West Coast for carrier planting. During post recovery analysis, when the tail plates were opened the MN were astonished at the hand wired TB-19s. They couldn't get over the pre-modular mine! How soon we forget!





Gulf of Mexico/MIREM exercise to test mine warfare training

INGLESIDE, Texas - Nearly 400 Sailors tested their mine warfare proficiency during Gulf of Mexico Exercise (GOMEX) 01-2 and Mine Warfare Readiness and Effectiveness Measurement (MIREM)-17 beginning June 11 and running through June 22.

GOMEX 01-2 marks the transition of Mine Warfare Readiness Group Four from training to ready-to-deploy status and includes integrated surface, air and explosive ordnance disposal (EOD) mine countermeasures (MCM) operations. MIREM 17 runs concurrently with GOMEX. The MIREM program was established to collect and analyze high quality data and to quantitatively assess readiness and effectiveness of Mine Warfare assets. The exercises will be conducted in the Gulf of Mexico, and at Naval

MCM forces participating in GOMEX 01-2 will be under the tactical command of Capt. Gregory Cornish, commander of Mine Countermeasures Squadron Three based at Ingleside.

Ships taking part in the exercises include the coastal mine hunters USS Oriole (MHC 55), USS Cormorant (MHC 57), and USS Shrike (MHC 62). The mine countermeasures ships USS Pioneer (MCM 9), USS Warrior (MCM 10), and USS Gladiator (MCM 11) will also participate in the exercise.


GOMEX/2-2-2-2


